1. CALL TO ORDER/ PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chair Hart called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. Committee Member Maltinsky led the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. Minutes of the May 10, 2007, Regular Meeting

IT WAS MOVED BY COMMITTEE MEMBER BURROR, SECONDED BY COMMITTEE MEMBER SMITH AND CARRIED 3-0-2, WITH COMMITTEE MEMBERS MALTINSKY AND PRIME ABSTAINING, to receive and file the minutes of the May 10, 2007, regular meeting as submitted by staff.

4. PUBLIC INPUT - None

5. OLD BUSINESS

A. Potential Future Agenda Items

Tom Bonigut, Environmental Programs Manager, reviewed the topics currently scheduled on the Potential Future Agenda Items list. He noted that he will not be present for the regular July 12, 2007, meeting, and Teresa McKinley, Management Analyst II, will be the staff support. Chair Hart suggested staff invite

Susan Ritschel, San Diego Water Board member, to provide insight into the status of the DPDES permit at a future meeting.

Tom Bonigut, Environmental Programs Manager updated the Committee on the Clean Ocean Fee Renewal progress, including issues related to Proposition 218 proposed revisions, renewal program approval timeline, controversial City issues at the forefront that may influence public sentiment, and details of the election/ballot process.

Chair Hart announced the establishment of the steering committee for the fee renewal and discussed potential strategies being considered to encourage public enthusiasm and support.

Committee Member Prime stressed the importance of educating the public as to the benefits the City has realized as a result of the Clean Ocean Fee program; and the fact that if the fee is not renewed, the costs of the mandatory programs currently covered by the fees will have to come from the City's General Fund, which will result in less money for other programs or amenities.

Future Agenda received and filed.

6. NEW BUSINESS

A. DANA POINT HARBOR REVITALIZATION PROJECT PRESENTATION RECEIVED AND FILED.

Vincent Gin, Engineering Manager for the County of Orange, narrated a slide presentation highlighting the Dana Point Harbor Revitalization Plan, including an overview of the major elements of the revitalization; launch ramp information and reconstruction plans; harbor dredging project timeline and details; proposed commercial core revitalization plans and renderings; slip inventory, wait list details, and proposed category revision; and Marina Inn statistics, uses, occupancy rates, and future plans. He addressed water quality issues in detail, including proposed activities to improve water quality at the harbor overall; dredging plans for Baby Beach, the pier, and harbor; parking lot water diversion techniques; bird waste filtering; and polystyrene biological impacts education and alternative product substitution efforts.

In response to questions from the Committee Members, Mr. Gin related a situation that occurred with the Sea Scout Youth Group that resulted in a perception that the County was curtailing their use of the Youth and Group Facility. In order to achieve the facility's highest potential, County staff has formally enforced rules that may not have been enforced in the past, which has resulted in misunderstandings and misconceptions. He noted the facility is designed for multi-purpose uses and the County intends to continue offering it to enrich youth education, while maximizing its potential for use to other groups. In

addition, he described the testing process to determine the presence of bacteria in sand; difficulties associated with determining bacteria sources; and testing strategies to determine the level at which the bacteria becomes a human health threat.

Committee Members thanked Mr. Gin for his presentation.

B. BACTERIA TMDL UPDATE RECEIVED AND FILED

Tom Bonigut, Environmental Programs Manager, narrated a slide presentation overview of Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL's) for Bacteria. TMDL's, the amount of pollutant that a waterbody can receive and still meet water quality standards, are required by the Federal Clean Water Act. They demonstrate action over planning, target important nonpoint sources of pollution, and promote public and private collaboration. He described how the TMDL process works; discussed water testing procedures, bacteria types, and bacterial indicator standards; reviewed the proposed bacteria TMDL loads/limits to San Clemente's ocean waters; and addressed options the City is considering to meet TMDL requirements. He discussed the challenges and issues facing the City to meet the standards and the proposed schedule for TMDL adoption; and provided the San Diego Regional Water Board's website address for additional information.

Tom Bonigut, Environmental Programs Manager, will provide the staff report regarding the Clean Ocean Fee Renewal in advance of the Tuesday City Council meeting where it will be presented. Chair Hart was elected to speak on the Committee's behalf, and he encouraged all Committee Members to attend.

9. ITEMS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Committee Member Maltinsky related the discussion and public testimony that occurred at the last Beaches, Parks, and Recreation Commission meeting concerning the use of the skate park by BMX cyclists. He noted supervision of the park would greatly increase liability to the City; placement of a sworn officer is being considered to authorize the issuance of citations and/or arrests if necessary; and BMX enthusiasts are organizing to identify a dirt area that can be converted into a dirt course for their use. In addition, he discussed a resident's proposal to eliminate the trap and skeet range, which has an excellent record with the City and attracts many users including individuals in wheelchairs, children, teens, and adults. The Commission voted unanimously to deny the resident's proposal. He and Chair Hart discussed the friendliness, kindness, and camaraderie of the range users. In addition, he updated the Committee on the progress of Courtney's Sandcastle funding; Steed Park improvements and reopening; and wireless tower proposed for San Gorgonio Park in exchange for restroom improvements.

Committee Member Prime announced he was not seeking reappointment to the Planning Commission due to his expanded work schedule and would no longer serve as liaison to this Committee. He has enjoyed the time spent on this Committee.

Committee Member Burror announced he was not seeking reappointment due to other commitments, noted his pleasure serving on the Committee, and commended his fellow Committee Members for their service.

Chair Hart thanked outgoing Committee Members Burror and Prime for their contributions to this Committee.

A regular meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission of the City of San Clemente was called to order on Tuesday, May 8, 2007, at 7:08 p.m. in the Ole Hanson Fireside Room of the Community Center.

MOTION BY WATERS, SECOND BY VANCE, CARRIED (6-0-0), to approve the Parks and Recreation Commission minutes of April 10, 2007.

6. OLD BUSINESS

A. Lawn Bowling Request for Artificial Turf

(Continued discussion from the 4/10/07 Commission meeting.)

Analyst Blackwood summarized the contents of her report on the findings reported by the Commission sub-committee, composed of Commissioners Maltinsky, Thomas, and Vance, on the feasibility of the request by the Lawn Bowling Club to replace the bowling green surface; reported that a number of different alternative surfaces were researched, including a miniature golf surface; advised that there is still an opportunity to make a funding request to Council before the 2007-08 budget is approved.

Ms. Blackwood responded to concerns outlined in a memorandum recently received from Mr. Spealman as follows:

- (1) Concern: The past experience with the Parks Department is that usually our requests are not acknowledged, and, if accomplished, not done in an effective way. Response: Her past experience with the staff of Beaches and Parks Maintenance Division is positive and demonstrates their ability to respond and accomplish requests in an effective way.
- (2) Concern: The design has already been established except that the fence should be higher to protect the property.

 Response: Follow up is needed for a higher fence to protect the property; commented that her understanding is that the lawn bowling club has requested resurfacing installed with a concrete base; explained that alternatives will be explored.
- (3) Concern: The funding should come from the City as does that for the tennis courts and other park facilities.
 - Response: The funding issue will be addressed by Manager Reed.
- (4) Concern: If there are other uses, they should be pursued after improvements have been made. It may take time to find compatible uses. Response: Before a final decision is made for joint use of the facility, staff will explore wear and tear on the surface and base.

Commissioner Vance reported that the sub-committee met with the lawn bowling club members and toured the facility; explained to club members that the Vital Few items have been established, and it is a challenge for the City as well as the Club; reported that club members pointed out that some income could be brought into the community such as by scheduling tournaments, but, as far as funds to help with improvements, it was uncertain if lawn bowling club members could be of help; suggested follow through on immediate items identified after the meeting; noted that it was not possible to section off a portion of the green surface for other activities since the total area currently used for playing lawn bowling is necessary.

Commissioner Thomas provided the following information researched by Commissioner Maltinsky: Explore purchasing excess artificial turf used for large park development projects for approximately \$1 a square foot; research alternative surfaces; help club members utilize their own talents for fund raising. Commissioner Thomas stated that temporary measures were not possible because patching the current surface is not feasible.

The meeting was opened to public input.

Howard Sharp, current Lawn Bowling President, thanked the Commission for its work; reported a metal strip around the bowling green playing surface is a safety issue; opined that multi-use of

the facility with bocce ball is not possible because of the difference in playing surface; questioned replacing the total green and suggested replacing only the surface without new sand and drainage; noted there were 25 members that played 15 games per week which totaled a lot of games played although not by many people; stated that the club was not disbanding even if the surface was not replaced.

Ted Farfaglia, lawn bowling member, referred to the Southwest Division of the United States Lawn Bowls Association letter outlining the revenue that could be generated by installing a new playing surface. He advised the Commission that the lawn bowling facility had a good chance to host national tournaments since the facility is centrally located.

Simon Meyerowitz, lawn bowler, stated that people of all ages can participate in lawn bowling; advised that major lawn bowling events would bring revenue to the City; explained the recruitment of lawn bowling players; noted that, in the 1980s, lawn bowling was the fastest growing sport; described it as peaceful and quiet.

Commissioner Thomas stated that it was difficult to fund a new surface for lawn bowling when the City is short funded for projects such as the La Pata Vista Hermosa Park (\$37,000), Courtney's Sand Castle (\$2 million), and the new senior center / fire house (\$2 million); referred to the maintenance that will be required; commented that the City is facing huge financial issues; acknowledged that lawn bowling is a great sport; pointed out that financial issues must be faced; promised to work with the lawn bowlers to see what can be discovered.

In response to Commission Van Auken's question regarding the reason this item was independent of the budget process, Ms. Blackwood advised that staff needed more time to explore alternatives before making a decision.

Director King advised that information is needed to develop a sound decision, and the budget process can not be held up.

Commissioner Vance pointed out that part of the process is the Vital Few, and the Commission needs to know the ramification on other projects if lawn bowling turf replacement is added.

Chairman McConnell stated that the Commission does value lawn bowling but questioned how it falls in the budget process; expressed the need to take a realistic approach.

MOTION BY VANCE, SECOND BY WATERS, CARRIED (6-0-0), that the Parks and Recreation Commission recommends that staff continue to work with the San Clemente Lawn Bowling Club on a proposed design, funding sources, and a plan for joint-use of the facility, and return later to the City Council with a request independent of the FY 2007-08 budget process.

B. Hours of Operation for Southerly Segment of the Coastal Beach Trail

(Continued discussion from the 4/10/07 meeting.)
Director King reviewed the contents of his report on the information gathered by the
Commission's sub-committee, composed of Chairman McConnell and Commissioner Maltinsky,
on the feasibility of different trail hours for the southern segment of the Coastal Beach Trail,
from south T-Street restrooms to Calafia Beach parking lot. He advised that City Council
requested staff revisit the hours of operation, and, as a result, two neighborhood meetings were
held with residents from the Boca del Canon and the Riviera area who reached a consensus of

6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. for the southerly segment of the coastal beach trail; added that State Parks District Manager Rich Rozzell is supportive of these hours.

Chairman McConnell commented that there is no opposition because the southern portion of the trail hours are the same as the beach hour.

MOTION BY THOMAS, SECOND BY VANCE, CARRIED (6-0-0), THAT the Parks and Recreation Commission recommends City Council approval of; Ordinance number _____titled: AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN CLEMENTE, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 9.12 OF THE SAN CLEMENTE MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO THE USE OF MUNICIPAL PARKS AND TRAILS.

C. Restroom Stall Doors

Beaches and Parks Maintenance Manager Reed summarized the contents of his report on research of the installation of restroom doors requested by the Commission at its March 13, 2007 meeting; pointed out that an inventory was conducted of all the restrooms that have or do not have doors; advised that many newer park restrooms are not designed for doors. He pointed out that it was too late to include this item in this year's budget process and suggested that the approximate cost to install doors on restroom stalls be included in the FY 2008-09 budget.

Commissioner Thomas thanked Manager Reed and staff for their positive attitude and responding to the Commission's concern.

Chairman McConnell suggested installing the doors on the ladies' room stalls first.

In response to Commissioner Vance's concern that delaying the project may cause it to be lost, Manager Reed responded that it would be included in FY 2008-09 budget and brought to the Commission in December and January as a FY 2008-09 budget package, Capital Improvement Projects (CIP).

D. Roller Hockey Facility Update

(Continued discussion from the 4/10/07 Commission meeting.)

Analyst Blackwood introduced Doug Garcia of the Orange County YMCA and Larry Corwin of Beach Cities Hockey Foundation; summarized the contents of her report on the status of the roller hockey facility as requested by Chairman McConnell; advised that staff was notified by the Planning Division that several individuals are interested in leasing the facility for a long term; pointed out that the owner has the right to cancel a lease with 60 days notice; stated that staff met with all known parties and is pursuing those individuals in an effort to retain roller hockey at the facility regardless of the tenant; advised that one meeting was held with the real estate broker, who represents the owner, and staff was informed that the YMCA is the front runner.

Larry Corwin, Beach Cities Hockey Foundation representative, distributed an income and expenses financial statement for the time period 2/2/07 through 4/30/07; reviewed and summarized the expenses and income for the organization; noted the increase in participation in Friday Night Skate; advised that the organization historically loses from \$3,000 to \$4,000 during the summer months, the slow time; noted that Friday Night Skate averages between 125 and 130 participants a week, double the number since 2006; stated that the organization is holding its own.

Mr. Corwin provided the following information to the Commission:

- \$12,115 was gained.
- The facility is only used 30% of the time.
- Day time is the slow time.
- The Roller Hockey Foundation will fulfill its commitment to the end of the year.
- The surface of the facility is excellent.
- The one limitation of the facility is the restroom which prevents events its use for events that include 150 people.

Doug Garcia, Beach Cities YMCA ("Y") representative, confirmed that he met with the real estate broker who indicated that the "Y" would be a welcome tenant; advised that the "Y" has marketing capabilities; described roller hockey as a good, wholesome sport; advised that he and other "Y" staff have met with City staff, and additional meetings are planned; invited the Commission to meet with "Y" staff.

Mr. Garcia responded to Commissioner Waters' concern regarding more use of the facility to generate fees and the possibility of losing the facility by advising that the "Y" is involved with young children to seniors; praised the roller hockey facility and described Larry Corwin as wonderful to work with; advised that the "Y" supports roller hockey and wants to expand the program.

Director King made the following statements: The bottom line is that staff has a vested interest in roller hockey. The economic value of the North Beach area has risen and is going to be greater as North Beach improves. It is a financial challenge and economic dilemma to bring the parks and facility on line, to operate and maintain it. Staff has a strong desire to protect the roller hockey program and is interacting with all the players to secure its future. The dialogue with the "Y" has a great potential. The primary concern is roller hockey's future in our community. Pursuing a variety of options encapsulates those issues. Monthly updates will be provided.

E. Miniature Golf

Analyst Blackwood reviewed the contents of her report on the status of the miniature golf facility proposed for the La Pata /Vista Hermosa Park site; advised that specialists in other City departments are engaged to assist Mr. Melcher refine all accessory uses and develop a firm business plan; staff and Mr. Melcher will continue on the various tasks that must be accomplished before a schematic design can be brought to the Commission for consideration and recommendation to Council.

F. Ralphs Skate Court Update

Manager DiCandia provided a verbal update on issues at Ralphs Skate Court that involve use of BMX bikes on the court with skateboarders; reviewed the steps being researched to prevent further vandalism such as installation of video cameras; noted that the City Attorney is reviewing the future use of video cameras; advised that risk management was apprised of an alternative for BMX bikes to provide a place to ride at Ralphs Skate Court; advised that research is being conducted on the manner other cities are addressing these issues; commented that some skate parks are supervised while others are unsupervised.

Manager DiCandia reported that the Joint Powers Insurance Authority (JPIA) ruled that joint concurrent use by skate boarders and BMX bikers not be allowed; advised that staff is looking at damage assessment and, possibly, leasing land to a third party to reassign the liability aspect.

Director King stated that data collection and investigative clarification to understand items and issues will be brought to the Commission for its consideration; advised that, at present, staff is not in a position to make a formal recommendation.

In response to Commissioner Loy's suggestion to consider BMX use at the roller hockey rink, Director King advised that staff is not in a position to comment on considering BMX use at the roller hockey rink.

The meeting was opened to public input.

Jesse Grimes, BMX rider, thanked the Commission for taking up this issue; reported that BMX bike manufacturers have indicated to him that they could provide financial assistance for a BMX site.

Nic Handy, BMX rider, stated that the roller hockey rink would need to be retrofitted to accommodate BMX bike use.

Oliver Scherillo, BMX rider, suggested use of two areas adjacent to the skate park that could accommodate BMX bikes.

Alicia Hanson, mother of four children, three of which are skate boarders, suggested the skate park be expanded; distributed a brochure from a skate park builder and a CD with a PowerPoint presentation about skate parks; described recently constructed parks; pointed out there are many skate board parks throughout the county. She stated that she would like to see a larger and better park.

Dan Kelsey, BMX rider, was concerned about safety and security; advised that he attends the Laguna Niguel Park; stated that interaction between BMX and skate boarders; informed that he rides the free parks at off hours; pointed out that fee based parks are open later; advised that the fee to attend a fee based park is \$10 a day or \$60 a year.

Nick Gates, BMX rider and Lake Forest coordinator at Etnies Skatepark, expressed concern that the San Clemente park is too small and dangerous; offered to volunteer to help design and promote sponsorships because of his experience with skate parks and the industry; provided the following information: (1) Bikes and skateboarders must be separate; (2) There is a liability issue if used concurrently; (3) Ralphs Skate Park served its purpose; (4) A larger area is needed; (5) Use of wooden ramps increases maintenance and are expensive; (6) wooden ramps are slippery when wet; (7) It's better to build a small portion in concrete initially; (8) Bikes can use a direct track. Mr. Gates provided information on the Lake Forest Skate Park, stating that it includes one web cam, three BMX sessions a week, there are rules and restrictions, everyone using the facility must sign a release of liability, the use of pads is enforced, and it is a safe place.

Brad Johnson, BMX rider, commented the skate park is great but suggested developing a way to use the land adjacent to it or another piece of land for its expansion; stated that it is great to have the park in San Clemente and promised to work to make it happen.

Nathan Wagner, BMX rider, agreed the park is very small; advised that weekends and after school time is crowded; stated that this needs to be addressed because it is dangerous; referred to ramps not big enough for upper level and more advanced riding; suggested lighting the skate court to utilize it after dark.

Since Mr. Wagner indicated that the BMX bike riders were not organized as a club or foundation. Commissioner Thomas suggested the BMX bike riders organize and fund raise.

Chairman McConnell recessed the meeting at 8:50 p.m.; the meeting reconvened at 9:00 p.m.

Cody Kavanaugh, BMX rider, told the Commission that the skate park is small and not really fun; advised that the Huntington Beach Nature Preserve allowed the bikers to dig a dirt course in Hidden Valley; asked that the bikers be given a lot to build on and promised that the bikers would dig a course to ride on; advised that his preference is a dirt track.

Jessica Hunter advised that there are many skate parks in Oregon and all are BMX friendly; volunteered to spearhead a fund raiser for a BMX location; opined that safety is the biggest issue.

Donald Redman advised that Laguna Niguel has two skate parks that do not allow BMX bikes; stated that signage at the parks states, "Ride at your own risk."

The meeting was closed to public input.

Chairman McConnell made the following comments: The primary concerns are how to make it safe and better. As far as expanding the skate park, the City has a great many financial issues. He expressed appreciation to all the BMX bikers for attending the meeting and advised that their comments will be taken into consideration.

Cody Kavanaugh agreed that San Clemente is a financial mess; however, he advised that the most that it would cost is \$200 and a good dirt lot.

Commissioner Van Auken suggested the BMX bikers get organized and then look for outside funding.

Chairman McConnell invited Mr. Yomogida, Coordinator for American Youth Soccer Organization (AYSO), to the podium since this concluded the topic on the skate court update and since Kent Yomogida was waiting patiently in the audience to update the Commission on AYSO activities.

Mr. Yomogida reported that: AYSO had a great season, soccer is played for 10 months a year; AYSO donated \$35,000 for field maintenance. The sports field has a six-week growing season for the turf.

Commissioner Thomas advised that he and Chairman McConnell are on the committee to raise funds for La Pata Vista Hermosa Park.

Mr. Yomogida commented that AYSO needs to raise some money; suggested artificial turf and lighting at Forster Ranch Community Park; pointed out that the only lighted field that AYSO can use is located at San Gorgonio Park; remarked that Senior Contract Inspector Mark Chavez is great; advised that AYSO had a game at San Gorgonio Park field number 3 and he doesn't know if the gate is being locked at night; hoped a fence would be installed at San Gorgonio Park field #2. He advised that youth sports organization members are working together.

In response to Commissioner Waters' inquiry regarding use by AYSO of the high school's artificial turf, Mr. Yomogida advised that CUSD charges \$1,000 for eight hours of use.

Director King responded to Commissioner Loy's inquiry regarding what measures the City is using to control vandalism, informing her that gates were installed at Forster Ranch Community Park and San Gorgonio Park and that staff is scheduled to lock and unlock the gates; advised that Liberty Park should be considered for a gate since there are similar problems; advised that staff is working on installing cameras at the skate park.

G. Monthly Report on Beaches, Parks and Recreation Major Assignments

A report from Director Al King on current, high priority projects and assignments. (Tabled for the June 12, 2007 meeting.)

7. NEW BUSINESS

A. <u>Dog Lovers Sign Program</u>

Analyst Blackwood reviewed the contents of her report on the non-profit San Clemente Dog Lovers organization's notification that the group is dissolving as an entity; will no longer manage the signage program at the Sgt. Baron von Willard Memorial Dog Playground, proposes termination of the agreement, use of any remaining funds support maintenance of the dog park, and transfer of the signage program to the Pet Project Foundation (PPF); pointed out that the agreement is an informal contract.

Director King advised that the topic will be reviewed by the City Attorney to develop an agreement since the Dog Lovers organization is disbanding.

Commissioner Thomas responded that the present agreement is not complicated, an agreement cannot be made with a non-profit organization, it is not a reassignment; and that it is just a letter of agreement.

Ms. Blackwood advised that staff was not suggesting the signage be removed, and staff does not want to cause any issue with the current organization.

Greg Lipanovich, San Clemente Dog Lovers representative, advised that the organization raised \$76,000; commented they had a good run; provided the following information: funds can only go to another non-profit organization such as the Pet Project Foundation (PPF); the cost of insurance is \$1,100 due this month, and he wants to dissolve the organization before the insurance is due. The signage program will be given to PPF.

Commissioner Thomas suggested Mr. Lipanovich merge the Dog Lovers organization with PPF so it can be absorbed rather than dissolved; mentioned that it is a simple solution that does not have to be reviewed by the City Attorney.

Valerie Treaster, Chairman of PPF, advised that PPF merged with FOSCA; brought the Dog Lovers' proposal to the PPF board, and the board agreed to take on the banner program; commented the Dog Lovers organization can easily meld with PPF; noted that it is a simple process, and PPF can probably double the income from the banner program. She commented that the two organizations have the same philosophy, but PPF has better bookkeeping.

Chairman McConnell commended the San Clemente Dog Lovers organization for its achievements and accomplishments; commented that the Commission supports the Dog Lovers option to disband. Received and filed.

B. Proposed Rental Fees for Steed Park

Manager DiCandia summarized the contents of her report on proposed rental fees for tournaments and sports fields at Steed Park; noted that tournament and field rental fees will help to offset the cost of staffing and operations to maintain Steed Park; advised that staff has received many calls to reserve the fields for tournaments in the upcoming year; noted that a field allocation meeting will be held contingent on approval of the operating plan and Commission recommendation for approval by Council of the new rental fees for the park.

Eric Elizalde, Director of AAU Baseball and resident, spoke on his desire to hold one tournament a month in San Clemente; supported the proposed new field rental fee schedule for Steed Park; promised his organization would bring revenue to San Clemente; named various locations in California where his tournaments are held, how he brings money to these cities, and that he operates the concessions in these cities.

Commissioner Thomas remarked that staff is looking for a concessionaire for Steed Park.

After discussion, the Commission made the following motion:

MOTION BY VANCE, SECOND BY VAN AUKEN, CARRIED (6-0-0), to recommend staff develop an appropriate resolution incorporating recommended fees for consideration by City Council.
