## 1. CALL TO ORDER/ PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mary Vondrak, Senior Management Analyst, called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. Committee Member Brown led the Pledge of Allegiance.

## 2. ROLL CALL

- Staff Present: Mary Vondrak, Senior Management Analyst Eileen White, Recording Secretary

In the absence of Chair Hart at the beginning of the meeting, it was moved by Committee Member Ambrose, seconded by Committee Member Nielsen, and unanimously carried to appoint Committee Member Brown to chair the meeting until Chair Hart arrived.

Agenda items are presented in the originally agendized format for the benefit of the minutes' reader, but were not necessarily heard in that order.

## 3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. <u>Minutes of the Joint Council/Commissions/Committees Meeting of October</u> 22, 2013

## 7. NEW BUSINESS

## A. <u>Clean Ocean Fee Renewal Update</u>

Mary Vondrak, Senior Management Analyst, provided a verbal update on the Clean Ocean Fee Renewal campaign. She announced that the final tabulation of votes occurred today, with the final tally of 53% in favor and 47% opposed. She speculated the higher than previous percentage of residents opposed to the fee is a result of the proposed increase and/or confusion regarding the fee's impact on time share properties. She recommended the Committee discuss the renewal fee process.

Chair Hart suggested staff contact the City Clerk's office for information and perform an analysis and evaluation of the vote statistics to determine strategies to improve the percentage in favor of the fee for the next fee renewal campaign.

Senior Management Analyst Vondrak agreed analysis and evaluation of the votes would be helpful for the next campaign; noted staff has decided to start disseminating information on the next campaign earlier in the process to ensure understanding of the fee's impacts and benefits; described confusion regarding the timeshare votes.

## B. <u>Pharmaceutical Drop Box Update</u>

Senior Management Analyst Vondrak reviewed the memo from Danna McIntosh, Environmental Services Coordinator, and an update on the implementation of San Clemente's Pharmaceutical Drop Box. She recommended the Committee receive and file the report.

Committee Member Ambrose requested that staff forward this memo to the City Council, and Councilmember Donchak in particular, to ensure that they are aware that the goal of establishing easily accessible pharmaceutical waste disposal has been achieved. She noted that this issue had been of particular interest to City Council during the Coastal Advisory Committee member appointment process.

## Report received and filed.

## C. <u>SANDAG Project Update</u>

Lawrence Honma, Independent Consultant, narrated a presentation entitled, "SANDAG-Beach Sand Project II, Construction Monitoring, City of San Clemente Coastal Advisory Committee, dated December 12, 2013." The presentation included an overview of the monitoring program elements, analysis of causes/conditions that lead to loss of sand, identification of issues concerning permits and regulatory agencies, and examination of the process of moving sand. Additional issues addressed included the importance of replacement sand texture, determining the best location of source sand, determining the best route for moving the sand, avoiding negative effects on the sand borrow site, and importance of close monitoring of the entire program. He displayed photos illustrating the condition of beaches before and after sand replacement efforts; addressed ancillary issues such as restricted surfing/swimming/fishing access during project construction; displayed maps of sand dredging and dumping sites; noted grunion monitoring very important to obtain permits; discussed short and long term impacts.

In response to questions from the Committee Members, Mr. Honma advised that most federal funding for sand replenishment is focused on the East Coast as the problem is most severe there; advised the dredger used for the project was moved from the East to the West Coast at a cost of 8 million dollars; advised results are somewhat dependent on weather conditions, with an average of 5 years before additional measures are warranted; discussed TOT funding for the project; advised City staff to discuss funding with staff at the cities of Solana Beach and Encinitas for funding particulars.

Senior Management Analyst Vondrak agreed to forward a copy of Mr. Honma's presentation to the Committee Members.

Committee Members thanked Mr. Honma for his time in creating and presenting the information.

## 8. COMMUNICATIONS

## A. Bacterial Monitoring Report Dated December 3, 2013

Senior Management Analyst Vondrak discussed effectiveness of weekend coyote decoys at Poche Beach; announced the ultrasonic device has been turned off for now; noted the falconer was working at the landfill at this time; noted the UV program is on its winter maintenance schedule.

Committee Member Nielsen speculated the presence of a lesser amount of birds in the pond area is a result of the abundance of anchovies in the surf.

## B. November 2013 Environmental Programs Update

Senior Management Analyst Vondrak briefly reviewed environmental programs on the update, with particular emphasis on clean up events.

Committee Members received and filed items 7A and 7B.

## 9. ITEMS FROM STAFF

## A. <u>Potential Future Agenda Items</u>

Mary Vondrak, Senior Management Analyst, reviewed the Potential Future Agenda Items and requested the Committee Members provide input. Committee Members added "Beach Trail Update" and "Poche Beach Action Plan Update" to the February agenda, with recommendation for a more comprehensive update and discussion in the spring; added "Sand Replenishment Program Update" to the March agenda.

In response to the Commission's discussion of a recently published letter regarding conditions and a variety of issues related to the Beach Trail, Senior Management Analyst Vondrak agreed to provide an update on Beach Trail issues to the Committee in February, and will work toward goal of providing a more comprehensive update involving informed staff in March if possible. She agreed to inform the City Manager of their concerns.

Chair Hart speculated that in-depth reporting on the Beach Trail has the potential to require a lot of Engineering Division, as well as Beaches, Parks, and Recreation Division staff time. He noted importance of identifying and quantifying the challenges, as well as determining whether intervention is needed and necessary to address. It's possible that recent events referred to the in the letter could be isolated incidents. He suggested it may be prudent for staff to postpone an in-depth review of the Beach Trail issues until/unless directed to do so by City Council.

Committee Members agreed the most prudent approach is for staff to gather as much information as possible for an update at the February or March meeting, and following discussion of the issues, the Committee will discuss potential for further review or action.

In response to a suggestion from Committee Member Smith that the Coastal Advisory Committee be involved in the decommissioning of SONGS, Chair Hart requested that Senior Management Analyst Vondrak discuss potential for their involvement/help in the decommissioning process with the City Manager and report back. Committee Members briefly discussed potential Plastic Bag Ban, and Senior Management Analyst Vondrak agreed to keep them updated on legislative efforts to pass a ban at the State level.

In response to a comment from Committee Member Smith regarding possible increase in sting ray population and/or injuries, Senior Management Analyst Vondrak agreed to contact Bill Humphreys, Marine Safety Chief, for information and report back.

Report received and filed.

## 10. ITEMS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Committee Member Smith reported that at their last meeting, the Beaches, Parks and Recreation Commission forwarded a recommendation to City Council that dogs be allowed in all City parks but prohibited from sports fields; did not support installation of dog waste disposal bags at parks; elected to receive additional bids for the completion of Courtney's Sandcastle due to bids coming in significantly over budget; formed an ad-hoc subcommittee to discuss guidelines for a memorial/tribute program for park/trail amenities.

Committee Member Nielsen recommended the Committee Members read a recent article in the San Clemente Journal regarding sand replenishment.

Committee Member Brown reported that the Planning Commission will receive an update on the Planning Division's upcoming tasks at their next study session; advised the City Council is moving closer to approving the Draft General Plan.

Chair Hart reported the City Council revised the Coastal Element of the General Plan in response to issues raised by homeowner; reported on recent Marine Corps dinner and night of entertainment and prizes provided by the Watershed Task Force.

The purpose of San Clemente's Environmental Sustainability Grant policy is to provide funding resources for environmental programs or projects that directly benefit the community. Revisions to the policy were adopted on April 2, 2013 which allow for organizations to request funding for well-established programs or services if a clear benefit to the City of San Clemente and community would be provided by the activity. Environmental Grant Committee members review each application and take into consideration the overall fit of the application compared to the guidelines of the grant, its direct benefit to the City of San Clemente community, and look for a well conceived and obtainable scope of work.

During the fiscal year 2014 budgeting process, City Council allocated funding for the Environmental Sustainability Grant for two application cycles. The deadline for this application period was December 15, 2013. There is \$10,000 available for this funding cycle. Nine applications were received by the application deadline requesting a total of \$15,000 for various non-profit and school entities. The applications are attached for your consideration.

The attached proposed funding breakdown was decided among the Grant Committee members and is presented for CAC Environmental The highlighted areas are a guide for the funding consideration. recommendations as follows: green indicates 100% of the requested grant is recommended for funding, yellow indicates a partial funding, and red indicates denied funding. The three grants that the committee recommends partially funding were determined to have material needs that could be provided by the City outside of this grant. The Concordia Elementary Garden Club application is being denied because they have not submitted a required Grant Summary Report for a previous Environmental Sustainability Grant award. The Ecology Center Backyard Skills Workshop & Lecture Series is a well conceived beneficial program to the community. With the limited funding available for this grant cycle and the Ecology Center ability to collect fees for their workshop, the committee suggests that their program would be least impacted by non-funding.

**Recommendation**: Staff recommends that the Coastal Advisory Committee recommend to the City Manager approval of seven grants as presented in the attached table, appropriating \$5,000 from the Clean Ocean Fund, \$4,000 from the Water Conservation Fund and \$1,000 from the Solid Waste Fund.

## CASA ROMANTICA CULTURAL CENTER AND GARDENS City of San Clemente Environmental Sustainability Grant Application December 10, 2013

## Casa Kids Garden Workshop

In past years, Casa Romantica has successfully utilized city sustainability grants to hold water wise workshops for the general public and homeowner's associations; print over 1,000 drought tolerant gardening brochures and maps; train docents to lead educational tours through the Casa's water sipping landscape; and recruit and train volunteers to care for the gardens. For the 2013-14 grant-year, the Casa proposes to offer four gardening workshops, for youth ages seven to ten years, during their spring and summer vacations from school.

The "Casa Kids Garden Workshop" will teach children how to propagate and grow low water plants, using herbs, succulents and California native plants at home. Each 1½ hour program will be taught by the Casa's Garden Director, Jodie Cook, with assistance from the Orange County Master Gardeners, interested Casa docents, and the Casa program director.

Class participants will:

1. Tour the various gardens on-site including: the herb and California native gardens, the butterfly garden, and the Native American garden.

2. Children will be encouraged to use all of their senses for pure enjoyment and as a way to identify some simple characteristics of low water using plants.

3. Class instructors will demonstrate, using the City's Watershed Model, how activities on land such as pesticide use, over-fertilizing, or overwatering in the garden can pollute the ocean.

4. Students will plant their own herb, succulent or native plants in 4-inch pots and take them home to care for them; and later transplant into their family garden.

5. Parents have the option of attending the last half hour of class for a tour by their child of the Casa gardens. Master Gardeners will remain to answer questions, offer gardening advice and distribute gardening and water conservation literature.

6. Families are encouraged to bring a bag lunch to eat outside on the ocean bluff or in the amphitheater after class. Light refreshments of cookies, herbal tea and lemonade will be served.

For 2013-14 we would like to accept 15 children per workshop for a total of 60 students plus an estimated 30 parents equaling 90 residents served.

Estimated Budget = Native wildflower seeds (\$3/packet x 60 packets = \$180); Four inch clay pots and saucers (\$1.75/pot x 180 pots = \$315); Herb and succulent cuttings (free); Master Gardener and docent recruitment and training by Casa Volunteer Coordinator (\$20/hour x 6 hours = \$120); Class time and preparation by Garden Director (\$22 /hour x 6 hours/class x 4 classes = \$528); and Program Director (\$22 /hour x 4 hours/class x 4 classes = \$352); Marketing and website promotion (\$28/hour x 2 hours/class x 4 classes = \$224); Fixed overhead expenses/utilities (15% of request = \$300); Refreshments (\$2.25/child x 60 students = \$135); Garden/office supplies and printing (ink, handouts, brochures = \$20) **Total Expenses = \$2,174** 

## Grant request = \$2,000\*

\* A modest \$3 fee/child will be charged (\$3/child x 60 = \$180) to pay for refreshments and expenses and over and above the \$2,000 grant request.

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## **Project Description**

The Earth Lodge at Clarence Lobo elementary school is the sister project to the Lobo Lodge Native American Museum, the only such exhibit to exist on a public school campus in the United States, to our knowledge. Both are part of the Indian education program, but designed to benefit all students in the Capistrano Unified School District. While the objective of Lobo Lodge is to teach students about Native American cultures, the objective of the Earth Lodge is to introduce students to the concepts of environmental studies with a focus on water ecology. What sets it apart is its mission to teach these concepts from not only a conventional scientific perspective but from a Native American perspective as well, which emphasizes respect for the environment and all the relationships within it. The exhibit showcases various water biomes with an emphasis on the San Mateo Creek watershed. With hands-on, interactive displays, the exhibit is commensurate with Common Core and the standards for the California environmental initiative in education.

After two years planning (and with very little funding and a completely volunteer effort) in November 2013 the Earth Lodge opened.

The next phase of our planning is to create a curriculum workbook and teaching guide, geared for K-5 students. The booklet will be approximately 20 pages and will mirror what children are taught in their tour of the Earth Lodge. It will accompany planned staff development workshops for teachers at the beginning of and throughout the school year.

A \$2,000 Environmental Sustainability grant from the city of San Clemente will allow us to develop and print the booklet and assist with the costs associated with staff development workshops. We would allocate \$500 toward the workshops, \$800 toward the writing of the booklet, and \$700 for printing costs.

For more information regarding the Earth Lodge project we are including some recent press coverage we received after our opening. While the Earth Lodge is for the benefit of all students of CapoUSD, it is students who are San Clemente residents who benefit the most as they are the ones who spend most of the time in the exhibit.

# Lobo Lodge Expands Educational Opportunities

Native American museum at SC school adds second building

ucked behind a San Clemente elementary school named for an Acjachemen leader now sits a pair of unique portable classrooms housing a native American museum.

Since its return three years ago, Clarence Lobo Elementary School's Lobo Lodge has allowed students in the Capistrano Unified School District the opportunity to examine the history of native and indigenous peoples across the country and in south Orange County. Led by a dedicated group of staff and volunteer docents, a second building, the Earth Lodge, has recently been added. The new addition will afford students the opportunity to explore, from both traditional western scientific and native perspectives, their own impact on local watersheds.

Staff members believe the lodges may be the only museums located on the grounds of an elementary school dedicated to the study of native cultures and peoples.

Members of the Lobo school family, as well as educators and members of area tribes, celebrated the opening of the school's Earth Lodge Monday, with tribal dances and words of thanks to those who helped make the museum possible.

The effort to bring the Earth Lodge to Lobo began two years ago, when the Children's Museum at La Habra was breaking down an exhibit on the science of water. Jacque Nuñez, a storyteller and

member of the Juaneño Band of Mission Indians, was got her hands on the display. With an exhibit in hand, volunteers pieced together the new lodge and, in the words of docent Dina Gilio-Whitaker, worked to "indigenize" the exhibit.

At that time, Nuñez worked as a storyteller at the museum. When employees there asked her to take look at the display, she was impressed, and she said she knew she wanted to do something with it. She thought of using the display for her and her husband's company, Tamaayowut, which supplies renewable energy sources to reservations. Nuñez looked at creating

a mobile education program, but ultimate-

ly decided it was unfeasible. "After that, I decided I would do anything I could to buy it from them," Nuñez said. "So I bartered with them, the old Indian way."

In exchange for telling a number of stories at the museum, Nuñez was able to ensure the display would be used for public education and outreach.

"I hope it opens students' eyes to know they can make a difference," Nuñez said.

The real work however, soon began, as volunteers from the community took two years to reassemble the exhibit with the addition of artifacts, photographs and displays to illustrate the native perspective. This was done, Whitaker said, with only \$1,000 in district funding, through a grant from the CUSD Foundation.

Whitaker said the new museum will provide insight into the native-American perspective on water. The exhibit includes information about how watersheds transport water from mountains down to the ocean, as well as the way water effects different types of ecosystems. Additions to the exhibit include a native home, the kiicha, to illustrate the way indigenous peoples made their homes near water and how they balanced their own needs with sustaining the waters.

"There's a whole different way of seeing

the relationship to water," Whitaker said. In recent years, she noted, western science had come to look more favorably on the understandings of native people had for water. Specifically, she said, this meant that rather than viewing resources like water only in terms of what could be extracted, it meant also understanding that humans are part of whatever ecosystems they inhabit.

"The challenges we face demand nothing less than the best of all cultures working together," Whitaker said. Not only are people to act as caretakers of the land, they also needed to understand they were part of it.

First-year Lobo principal Cheryl Sampson said students at the school were "Very much a part" of the lodge, with students learning songs and dances, along with being able to tour the facility to provide real illustrations on lessons about native cultures. Having the new Earth Lodge on campus only enhances those educational efforts, she said.

"It really ties into our new core curriculum and standards," Sampson said.

Trustee Amy Hanacek said the lodge would provide something unique for district students.

"I think it shows we are always expanding and creating something for everyone, (Cont. on page 6)

so that everything is a learning opportunity," Hanacek said. "We're making a strong push in STEM education (science, technology engineering and math) and this incorporating native Americans and what they have given to where we are today, from an ecological point of view."

Hanacek said by providing the opportunity for children to have hands-on experience, both in being able to study native American cultures, and now the science of water, students will better understand what they were being taught.

"I think this is going to be exciting to finally bring the kids through, to have the field trips," Hanacek said. "I think it's connecting. It connects all the kids in the district who'll be able to experience this. I'm just blown away. I had no idea how excellent this was, and it's obviously a labor of love. I'm really proud of this school district."

#### NATIVE AMERICAN EDUCATIONAL OP-PORTUNITIES AT CUSD

While the district has had a program in place since the 1970s, itwas originally located at San Juan Elementary School in San Juan Capistrano. When Lobo opened in 1994, it was moved there, then to R.H. Dana Elementary School in Dana Point. It returned to Lobo in 2010. The program provides tutoring and educational opportunities for both the 250 native students in the district, as well as providing educa-

tional opportunities, like the lodges, for non-native students.

Stacy Yogi, the executive director for state and federal programs, who oversees the district's efforts, said both lodges would be made available to students from around the district immediately for field trips. The program receives just over \$42,000 in federal funds.

"It's a wonderful cultural resource," Yogi said. "It's a really great project for native American students as well as others."

Nathan Banda, who chairs as president of the district's Native American Parent and Student Committee, was part of the program while a student at San Juan. Now, as a parent, he sees the goal of the program as one of expanding educational opportunities for native students. This includes providing family nights where native students can dance and share their own tribal cultures, since the area has native students from tribes throughout the country. Banda said the program also partners with area colleges to make it feel like a much more real possibility, including overnight visits to UCI. Banda said that process begins in middle school.

Many of the artifacts in both lodges are from the personal collection passed down through generations of Kogee Thomas. Thomas is a long-time educator who helped start the American Indian Studies Center at UCLA and the American Indian Resource Program at UCI. She has also worked at CUSD as a teacher in the program since 2000. She was instrumental in setting up the program in the 70s.

Thomas said the goal of the new lodge is to foster a sense of ownership for resources among new generations.

"We're trying to impart the message, 'one person, one earth, one change," Thomas said.

While Thomas was quick to focus on the next generation of educators, such as Whitaker, Nuñez and Banda, all three said Thomas' example was a key one to follow.

"When Kogee calls, everyone listens," Nuñez said. "She has that way about her."

Thomas said she was happy now to see others step forward to carry on her work, and that new educational opportunities for all students were being created.

"They're now working on making the dream a reality," Thomas said. "That's much more important than just having the dream." **SC**



I started working on the Lobo Garden this year, because I was tired of seeing it in disarray all these years, and because I am a passionate gardener.

My first goal while revamping the garden was not only to create something visually pleasing, but also something that could have been used as a teaching tool for the students.

I thought that each class, in partnership with their teachers could have had a hands on experience in planting some seeds( according to the seasons). Thus the kids would have hopefully learned about the plant cycle and also could have seen how food is grown.

My second goal was to also teach responsibility to the children, by assigning a portion of each planter to a class and implementing a watering schedule. #### San Clemente High School Environmental Alliance Grant Continued

Project Carbon-Free SC is based on the principles of limiting our carbon footprint through means of increasing native flora and decreasing our disposable plastic water bottle consumption. Project Carbon-Free SC is composed of several stages. Stage one is to exponentially increase recycling and educating our student body on proper trash sorting techniques. For stage one to be successful, the purchase of additional recycling bins is necessary. Stage two is the removal of invasive species and dead foliage and the addition of native species. For the success of stage two to be accomplished, materials need to be purchased to remove the invasive and dead foliage and new native species will need to be purchased. Finally, stage three is the addition of Brita hydration systems to more class rooms and outdoor areas, to encourage and increase the simplicity for students to use reusable water bottles. For stage three to be successful the purchase of fifteen to thrifty new Brita hydration systems and filters is necessary.

Project Beauty is mainly based on restoring our campus' natural beauty through the replenishment of the vitality of the campus' greenery. Students will partake in maintaining the campus' greenery through trimming, planting, and removing species. The idea is to leave our local environment in better shape than we found it. Project Beauty also includes the collection and disposal of trash on a weekly basis, to limit the amount of trash ending up in the storm drains and our oceans. The most important aspects of Project Beauty are our weekly adopt-a-beach and bi-monthly watershed clean ups. The grant will enable the alliance to purchase new materials and resources to extend our influence. The importance of these programs allows the alliance to extend its impact farther than just the high school. These programs allow the alliance to play an influential role in the protection of our beautiful city's environment, as well.

These two projects: Carbon-Free SC and Project Beauty, will have tremendous impacts on our local environment and the enthusiasm towards environmental stewardship throughout the community. Subject: Strategic Priority Planning – Upcoming Budget Process

Unlike years past, the upcoming Fiscal Year 2015 budget preparation process will not include a separate Strategic Priority Planning workshop. Instead, an update on existing strategic priorities will be included as part of the Long Term Financial Plan (LTFP) workshop which is scheduled for February 25<sup>th</sup>. However, the City Manager will be interested in any recommendations from the Commissions and Committees regarding potential Capital Improvement Program (CIP) projects which should be considered during the budget process. Also, this year's LTFP will include two topics of interest for the Coastal Advisory Committee: San Replenishment and the Marine Safety Building relocation. The issue papers should be available in mid-February in advance of the LTFP workshop.
