## Myths and Facts about SR-241 Toll Road Extension and I-5 Managed Toll Lanes



Myth #1: San Clemente wants to return to the Green Alignment.

Fact: San Clemente <u>OPPOSES</u> the Green Alignment and does not want to see the SR-241 toll road extension go through either Trestles *or* the middle of the City of San Clemente.



Myth #2: San Clemente are just being NIMBYs who don't want to do their part to help relieve traffic.

Fact: San Clemente is happy to look at traffic solutions that will actually reduce traffic in the region and will gladly bear its fair share of potential impacts.



Myth #3: SR-241 toll road extension will solve South Orange County's traffic problems.

Fact: All published studies, including the recent IBI Group study, have shown that the SR-241 toll road extension will have no effect on traffic congestion in South Orange County.



Myth #4: New toll roads will pay for themselves and will eventually be free.

Fact: The existing SR-241 toll road was supposed to be free by 2035. That date has already been delayed until at least 2057.



Myth #5: Managed toll lanes along the I-5 will reduce traffic.

Fact: No studies have been produced which show that managed toll lanes along I-5 will reduce traffic.



Myth #6: A new managed lanes on the I-5 can be done with minimal impacts to local homeowners and businesses.

Fact: When the I-5 alternative was studied in 2007, TCA stated in their public comments that this project would displace nearly 2,000 residents in 838 homes and "sweep away" 4,150 employees in 382 businesses.



Myth #7: Managed lanes on I-5 are environmentally preferable to other options

Fact: TCA stated in 2007 that the I-5 widening was a "16-mile scar slicing through our neighborhoods" and there would be "enormous destructive natural and human environmental costs of the I-5 widening alternatives."



Myth #8: New toll roads are the only way to help South Orange County's traffic problems.

Fact: Studies have shown that simply building the approved Measure M2 and MPAH 2040 projects will provide a significant benefit to the region for substantially less cost than any proposed toll road extension.
