He stated it is unknown at this time what the next budget cycle will look like, and does not want to provide false expectations that funds will be available for the grant awards.

### 5. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

A. Education Topic: Child, Adolescent, and Young Adult Needs and Issues.

<u>Susan Parmelee</u>, Wellness and Prevention Center, thanked and appreciated the Human Affairs Committee and the City of San Clemente for advocating and supporting these non-profits that provide so much for the community.

<u>Blair Veraza</u>, Connect OC Coalition, works with young adults, ages 18 to 25, outlined the impacts COVID has had in this age bracket including virtual burnout and not being supported by adults in an encouraging manner

considering the circumstances. They're seeking creative ways to open and share with adults who are empathetic and can provide points of connection.

<u>Erika Fairweather</u>, San Clemente High School Counselor, stated the largest issues she has observed at the high school level are technology and connectivity issues, student motivation, work completion, and an increased drop in grades to below the seventy percentile. 51-52% of students are now 100% online learning. Tutoring is available at the high school after school for those students in need.

<u>Deputy Lindsey Rodgers</u>, School Resource Officer, works with ten schools in San Clemente. She is currently doing 2-3 student welfare checks daily, and most of the time, the students are alone, not supervised, with no assistance, leaving the student feeling down and apathetic. There has also been an increase in alcohol usage amongst juveniles.

<u>Joyce Toledo</u>, Bernice Ayers Middle School Counselor, stated one of the biggest issues she is experiencing is the lack of structure, organization skills, and time management. There is an intervention program called SWELL that is available Monday-Friday via virtual or on-site.

<u>Teri Steel</u>, C.O.A., stated kids involved with C.O.A. are missing in-person interactions with their peers and activities that stopped due to COVID. The kids have stated there are parties all over town on green belts and house parties. Representatives of C.O.A. have also seen an increase in alcohol usage amongst teens.
