

Overall, how would you rate the quality of life in the City of San Clemente?








How would you rate the quality of health care available today in your area of San Clemente?










More than nine-in-ten voters recognize that there is not an open hospital in San Clemente.

Nearly eight-in-ten voters think the nearest emergency room or hospital is too far away.


Do you feel that the closest _____to your home is too far away or not too far away?






Awareness of the City's efforts to reopen a hospital in San Clemente is low, with only 2% saying they have heard a lot about it.

Have you heard, read, or seen anything recently about the City's search for a new healthcare provider to run a local hospital in San Clemente?








Opinions on Creating a New Hospital

Do you favor or oppose creating a new hospital in San Clemente?






Additional Information about the Former Hospital and Plans for a New Hospital

As you may know, the Saddleback Memorial Medical Center on Camino de los Mares in San Clemente closed in 2016 and there are currently no hospitals or emergency rooms open in the city of San Clemente. The City has explored many options for attracting a healthcare provider to take over the former Saddleback Memorial Medical Center. All of the experts who have analyzed the building have said that it would take approximately \$200 million to either rebuild the closed hospital, or to knock it down and build a new one that meets the city's current needs and hospital standards, or to build a new hospital at a different location.



A majority favor using public funds to pay for the construction of a local hospital, but far more voters favor the idea at a conceptual level.







Q6. Do you favor or oppose creating a new hospital in San Clemente?


Q7. Would you favor or oppose the City of San Clemente using public funds to pay for the construction of a local hospital in the city?


Nearly two-thirds favor either of the proposed locations for a new hospital in San Clemente, with little variation between locations.




Text of Hypothetical Ballot Measure Tested in Survey

San Clemente Hospital/Public Health Measure

To improve local access to emergency and inpatient/outpatient medical care, natural disaster/public health emergency preparedness, recruit/retain physicians/nurses, by building a new hospital in San Clemente meeting seismic safety standards, shall the measure authorizing \$204,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, funded by levying 3¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, providing \$10,100,000 annually for 30 years, requiring independent audits, oversight, all funds for a San Clemente hospital only, be adopted?




Solid majorities support a bond measure to construct a hospital for either location, but initial support is less than the two-thirds threshold necessary for passage.





Voters who live near the existing Saddleback Hospital are somewhat less supportive of the measure for that location. There is little difference in opinions on the Talega location based on where voters live in the city.


Q9 (Total). Would you vote yes in favor of the measure or no to oppose it?

By Age







By Residence



The measure has bipartisan support, with stronger support from Democrats.







(Ranked by Extremely/Very Important)







Impact of information


The bond measure to rebuild at the existing site slightly exceeds the two-thirds threshold after supportive information, but after all messages, support for the measure dips below the initial level for both sites and is well under the threshold necessary for passage.

A small number of voters are more likely to support the measure with a lower bond and tax amount, which would require San Clemente to partner with other communities on a measure.

Choosing Between Hospital Locations


There is a clear preference for the old hospital site over the new Target location after all information.

The City could purchase the old Saddleback Memorial Hospital on Camino de las Mares, 46% demolish it, build a new hospital, and find a hospital operator to run it. OR The City could build a new hospital on vacant land it owns north of the Target store at Avenida Vista Hermosa near the Talega 29% neighborhood, and find a hospital operator to run it. OR Would you prefer that the City does not build 24% a new hospital in San Clemente at all. Don''t know

Conclusions

Conclusions

- San Clemente voters are well aware that there is not an open hospital in the city, perceive that the nearest hospital/emergency room is too far away, and strongly support the idea of creating a hospital in the city.
- At the same time, only an extremely small percentage of voters is closely following the City's efforts to have a hospital developed in San Clemente.
- A majority favors using City resources to help build a hospital and nearly two-thirds favor either replacing the old hospital with a new building or building a new hospital near the Talega neighborhood.



Conclusions, continued

- A bond measure with a focus on building a new hospital at the existing site reached the two-thirds support level when voters were informed of why the City would be interested in pursuing it.
- But, at the current time, support for a bond measure to provide the funding necessary to build a hospital does not consistently meet or exceed the two-thirds threshold necessary for the passage.
- While both potential sites have support in concept, voters have a clear preference for rebuilding a hospital at the existing site over developing the Talega site.



Conclusions, continued

- If the City wishes to pursue a bond measure for a new hospital, it should consider this goal to be a long-term priority which will require time and resources for public outreach and education.
- Residents are aware of the current problem, but need to learn more abut why a bond measure would be a good investment, that would help improve the availability of emergency medical care for residents.
- This goal has a greater chance for voter support with a focus on building at the existing hospital site, rather than trying to develop the site near the Talega neighborhood.
