Meet our New Division



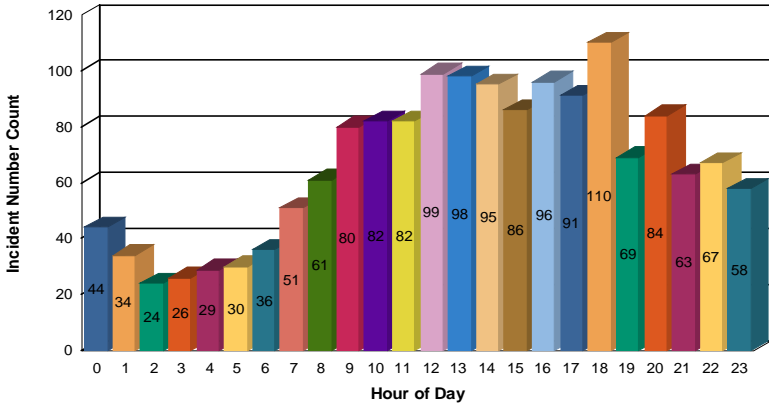
As of October 21st, Division 3 will have a new Fire Chief. Please welcome Chief Cheyne Maule. Chief Maule began his fire service career in 2004 with the City of Garden Grove Fire Department (GGFD), serving first as a Firefighter/Paramedic, then a Fire Captain, and beginning in 2017 a Battalion Chief. As he worked his way up through the ranks, Chief Maule also served as GGFD's EMS/Paramedic coordinator, taught tactics and strategy classes for aspiring Captains, managed and administered the Fire Captains promotional process, and implemented the department's first fitness/wellness program.

Chief Maule began his OCFA career when GGFD transitioned to the agency in August of 2019. Since then, Chief Maule has served as a Battalion Chief for Battalions 8 and 6, and most recently was in his second year as Air Operations Manager. Chief Maule was a Chief of the Year Honoree for the OCFA's Best and Bravest Awards.

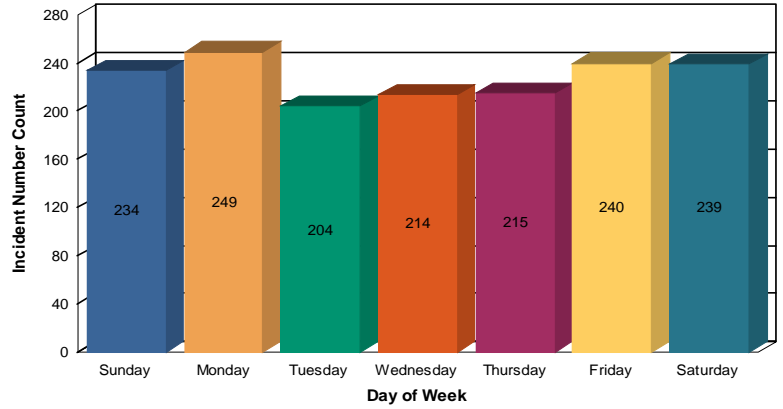
Chief Maule lives in Mission Viejo with his wife of 19 years and their three sons. He is excited to be serving the city of San Clemente again.

Incidents by Category

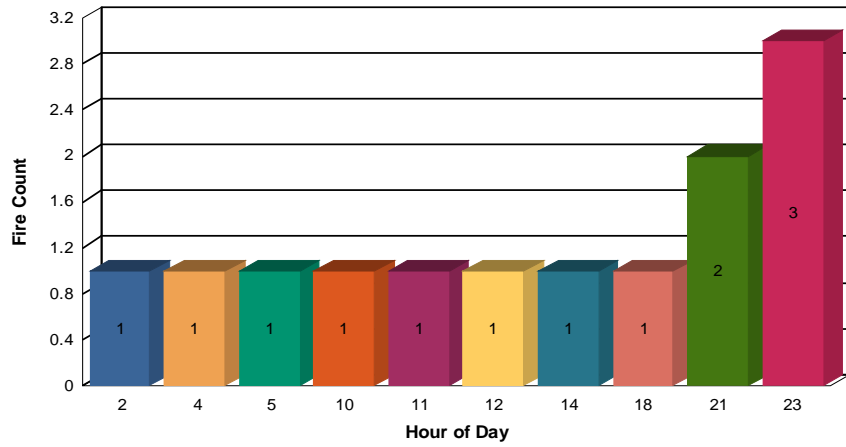
Incident Count by Hour of Day



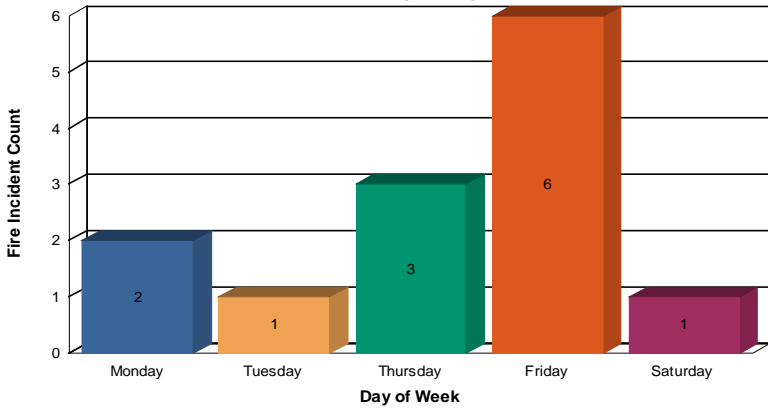
Incident By Day of Week



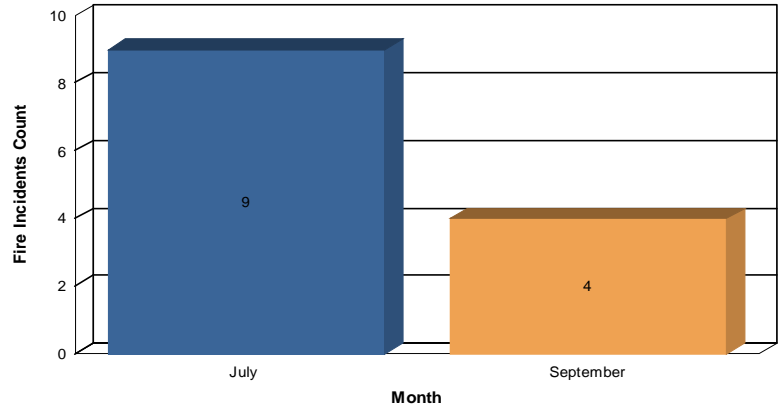
Fires by Hour of Day

DISASTER SUPPLY KIT



A disaster supply kit should include enough food, water, and other important items to last everyone in your household at least three days. It should also be portable in case you need to evacuate. Be sure to consider individual and family needs, including pets, when building your disaster supply kit.



It's important to have disaster supply kits at your work, in your car, and in your home. Ready made kits are available for purchase or you can choose to build your own.

Home Disaster Supply Kit

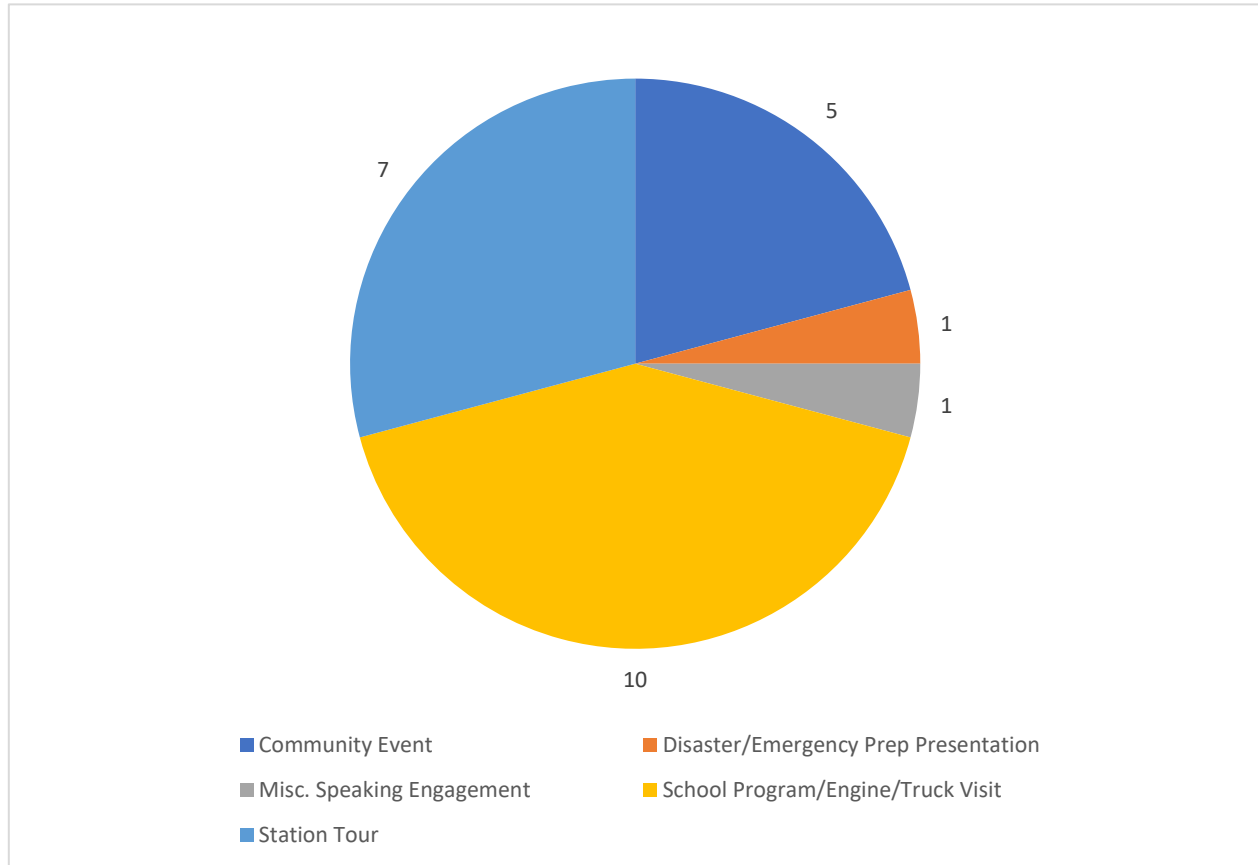
- Water (1 gallon per person per day)
- Non-perishable food and manual can opener
- Battery powered radio and extra batteries
- Flashlights (one per person) and extra batteries
- First aid kit, including manual
- Prescription medications
- Spare eyeglasses
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask to filter contaminated air
- Personal sanitation items (soap, shampoo, toothbrushes, etc.)
- Portable shelter (tent, sheet, or blankets with duct tape)
- Toilet paper and garbage bags for waste
- Tool kit, including wrench to turn off utilities
- Heavy gloves for clearing debris
- ABC fire extinguisher
- Cooking/eating necessities, including cups, plates, utensils and paper towels
- Local maps
- Cash (small bills and change)
- Copies of important family documents
- Food, water and supplies for pets

Your Firefighters in Action

September 30th
Incident # 22-130783

In the early morning hour on Camino De Los Mares, a solo driver hit a tree in the median, shearing off the roof. Both the vehicle and the tree caught fire. Fortunately, a bystander extricated the driver before the fire.

Engine 50 and Truck 59 arrived on scene and extinguished the fires while our paramedics performed advanced life support before transporting the patient to the hospital.

July 18th
Incident # 22-093691

At 4:38am a fire was reported at La Siesta restaurant on N. El Camino Real. It was quickly upgraded to a 2nd alarm with approximately 50 firefighters. Crews forced entry through multiple sides of the building and had a knockdown in just 39 minutes. Effective coordination between the firefighters inside, cutting ventilation holes on the roof, and ventilating with large fans at the doors resulted in solid work and no injuries.
