

## Wildlife Sightings (Mountain Lions, Coyotes, and Bobcats)

## **Coyote Safety Reminders:**

- DON'T FEED COYOTES. Their lives and your safety depend on coyotes remaining wild and naturally wary of people.
- Remove attractants; pick up trash, secure garbage, and feed pets inside. Don't leave food or pets outside at night.
- Walk dogs on leashes, especially during pup rearing season (April-August). Pick up your small dog if you see a coyote and don't let pets roam.
- If approached, don't run. Wave arms, make noise and walk toward the coyote until it retreats. Be "Big, Bad and Loud."
- Avoid areas where coyotes may be denning or feeding/hiding pups.

## San Onofre Decommissioning Update

According to Southern California Edison, 2023 was a pivotal year for decommissioning at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS), as the decommissioning project is more than 50 percent complete. 2023 Highlights include:

- Complete removal of the Unit 3 turbine gantry crane, turbine building, and structures. The turbine deck once stood 73 feet tall.
- 70 percent of the buildings onsite have been demolished (40) with 22 remaining.
- To maintain public access, the beach walkway was repaired and vehicle barriers removed.
- In 2023 alone, 143 million pounds of waste was shipped offsite, making a total of 302 million pounds of waste removed since the start of decommissioning. To put this in perspective, 4,500 waste shipments have left the site.
