The regular meeting of the City Council of the City of San Clemente was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, 408 N. El Camino Real, San Clemente, California, WEDNESDAY, December 20th, 1944, at 8.00 o'clock, p.m. - Mayor LeRoy M. Strang in the Chair.

HUTS FOR. BOY SCOUTS.

Communication from E. W. Laird, Commander USCG, Eleventh Naval District, Long Beach 2, stating that our request for the loan of two of the prefabricated buildings now stored at the Coast Guard District Supply Base, San Clemente, has been referred to Coast Guard Headquarters, Washington? D.C., and we would be advised when reply had been received from there; was read and ordered filed.

The Clerk was directed to inform the Boy Scouts of contents of letter.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS.

Mr. James Corley, Vice President of the Reeves
Rubber Company Inc., appeared before the Council and informed
them that there were certain conditions in the neighbourhood
of their plant they would like to see bettered; one being the
unsightly condition of the property adjoining theirs owned by
a "exican which sure was an eyesore, and the other was the
had condition of the street leading from the highway 101 into
the plant in the Industrial District.

Mr. Corley stated thay had two car loads of heavy machinery in Los Angeles. Some of their Directors wanted it to stay in Los Angeles, but he and several others wanted it brought down here. However, they were not going to put their money into it here unless conditions were bettered. If they could get some co-operation from the City they were willing to stand a portion of the expense of reconditioning the street.

Replying to "ay or Strang as to what class of street they wanted, he said he did not know as he was not familiar with street condition. He thought it made no difference what kind of street so long as it was smooth. He said there had not been much incentive for them to go ahead and fix the place as they would like. He also said he did not know what action had been taken in requesting this service from the City previously, but that was all past history and he wanted to state start right infrom now and see what could be done towards getting rid of the unsightly condition of the premises next to their plant and the reconditioning of the road from the plant to the main highway.

Mayor Strang stated that a couple of meetings ago the Superintendent of Public Works, Mr. James H. Bennett, was authorized to have street put in shape; since which time however we have had sweer trouble and other things which has kept it from being started. We tried to spread stryymoney over and do best we can with it. We want to fix up your street and will help in every possible way.

Mayor Strang invited Mr. Oliver H. Robertson, a former Mayor of the City, and now a Member of the Reeves Rubber Plant Staff to say a few words. Mr. Robertson said Mr. Corley had covered everything pretty well. He said he hoped things could be straightened out so that the machines mentioned by Mr. Corley as being in Los Angeles could be brought down here and installed. This would boost their present pay roll appreciably. If the machines were installed in Los Angeles on account of no co-operation being extended to the Company here the rest of the stuff might be pulled out of here and taken to Los Angeles leaving an empty building down here.

Mr. Corley was assured by the Mayor that the street would be completely resurfaced starting next week if weather fine, also that every effort will be made to have the land adjacent to the plant cleaned up by the Mexican living there.

DATA ON ROAD CONSTRUCTION TO REEVES RUBBER PLANT IN INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT.

Councilman Smith wanted to know what kind of construction they had in mind for the street leading from the highway to the Reeves Rubber Plant.

James H. Bennett, Supervisor of Public Works, stated that there was 120,000 square feet of street to

be rapaired. With good heavy oil and #4 crushed rock this will run approximately \$ 3,500.00 -

The present surface could be used as sub-grade for ashphaltic mix to a depth of approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$, cost of

which would approximate \$12,000.00 I would advise against tearing up or regrading during the winter months as one good rain during construction would make this street impassable.
