CONSIDERATION OF A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE 2023-2024 CONSOLIDATED ANNUAL PERFORMANCE EVALUATION REPORT (CAPER) FOR EXPENDITURE OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT FUNDS

#### Fiscal Impact:

There is no fiscal impact related to filing the CAPER.

#### Summary:

This is the review and approval of the Fiscal Year 2023-24 CAPER, which summarizes the City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program's expenditures and accomplishments. Each year, the City submits an Annual Action Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in May and the CAPER in September to satisfy federal grant requirements to continue to receive funding. During the 2023-24 reporting period (July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024), the City received \$314,259.00 in CDBG funds. In addition, \$81,679 in prior year uncommitted funds and \$45,145.56 in program income (i.e., housing rehabilitation loan repayments) were also available.

#### Background:

Each year, HUD determines the amount of CDBG funds the City is entitled to receive based on population, household income, and housing needs. To continue receiving CDBG funds, the City Council must approve the CAPER, which summarizes program expenditures and accomplishments for each CDBG-funded activity for the prior year, i.e., the FY 2023-24 reporting period. The City must submit the CAPER to HUD within 90 days after the end of the fiscal year.

The CAPER requires a 15-day comment period to allow the public to submit comments in writing. Residents may also provide comments at the September 17, 2024 City Council meeting. A public meeting is required twice a year to receive Federal CDBG grants. The first meeting is to adopt the Annual Action Plan, which will typically take place in May. The Annual Action Plan identifies the projects and programs the City will undertake during the upcoming fiscal year to meet the goals identified in the City's Consolidated Plan (defined below). A second meeting is held after the end of the fiscal year to review and evaluate how the funds were spent; this City Council meeting meets the latter requirement.

#### Discussion:

Every five years, the City prepares a Consolidated Plan. The Consolidated Plan is a five-year strategic plan that identifies priority housing and community needs and how CDBG funds will be used to meet these needs. The current Consolidated Plan was adopted in May 2020. At the end

of each fiscal year, the City is required to submit its year-end performance report, the CAPER, to HUD.

#### FY 2023-24 Accomplishments

Maintaining safe and decent housing for lower-income San Clemente homeowners and renters is a priority need identified in the City's Consolidated Plan. To this end, the City provides loans and grants to eligible households via the Home Rehabilitation Program. The City has funded this program with CDBG funds since 1994. Due to program consultant and staffing changes and a need to update the program to attract interest, the program was put on hold during Fiscal Year 2023-24; therefore, no housing units were rehabilitated. Additionally, CDBG funds were allocated to provide local businesses with a grant (up to \$2,000) to update business signs or building facades. Businesses must be located in CDBG-eligible areas of the City. No grant applications were received during the reporting period.

CDBG funds were also allocated to improve City public facilities. The 2023-24 Fiscal Year Action Plan provided CDBG funding to begin a multi-phased reconstruction of four historical water fountains at Max Berg Park. Restoring the fountains will help preserve and enhance the historic nature of the park and surrounding neighborhood. Phase One of the project includes the preparation of the required National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) review and, subsequently, the preparation of the design documents. During the reporting period, the City's historic resources consultant reviewed the history of the park and initiated discussions with the California of State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) regarding the intrinsic historical value of the fountains. This phase of the project carefully analyzes the historical elements of the four water fountains and provides direction on a historically compliant restoration scope of work. Phase 1 work will continue into the 2024-25 reporting period.

CDBG funding was also allocated to support various public service programs. Public service programs benefit the community, families, and individuals by addressing critical social service needs. During the 2023-24 fiscal year, service providers assisted 2,754 residents through services funded by CDBG.

Additionally, CDBG funds were allocated for program administration (CDBG program consultants, who help the City administer the grant and the City's Housing Rehabilitation Program). Table 1 summarizes the programs and activities detailed in the 2023-24 CAPER.

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1. No loans or grants were approved during the FY 23-24 reporting period due to staffing changes and the reevaluation of the existing program guidelines.

2. Phase 1 of the project was initiated but not completed during the reporting period.

During the fiscal year, the City also receives repayments of past CDBG-funded home rehabilitation loans - \$45,146 in "Revolving Loan" funds. Unspent Revolving Loan funds are carried to the following fiscal year to help fund additional housing rehabilitation loans. Unspent CDBG funds committed to ongoing activities, such as the Max Berg Park project, will be carried into the current fiscal year. Unspent CDBG funds from completed or canceled activities will be reprogrammed in future years for new CDBG-eligible activities.

Finally, the CAPER reports that the City leveraged CDBG funds. During this reporting period, \$293,827 in Permanent Local Housing Allocation (PLHA) funds were used to support activities consistent with the Consolidated Plan goals. These services are for Homeless Outreach Services provided by the City's Community Outreach team.

#### **Council Options:**

- Adopt Resolution No. 24-141, which will approve and adopt the 2023-24 Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) for submittal to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
- Modify and adopt Resolution No. 24-141.
- Continue the item with direction to staff to provide additional information.
- Do not approve Resolution No. 24-141, which will result in the City being out of compliance with reporting obligations.

#### **CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes**

### Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

The City of San Clemente is a recipient of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). CDBG funds may be used for various activities, provided the primary beneficiaries meet HUD's definition of a low- and moderate-income individual. To receive CDBG funds, the City is required to prepare a strategic plan that identifies housing and community needs, prioritizes needs, and identifies programs and goals to address priority needs. This strategic plan is known as the Consolidated Plan. The current Consolidated Plan was approved by the City Council in May 2020 for the five years of Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21 through FY 2024-25. On an annual basis, the City prepares an expenditure plan (the Annual Action Plan) that lists specific activities the City will carry out with CDBG funds that meet the housing and community needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. At the end of each fiscal year, the City is required to prepare an accomplishment report. This report is the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER). In addition to comparing planned versus actual accomplishments for the respective fiscal year, the CAPER tracks the City's progress toward meeting the 5-year goals established in the Consolidated Plan.

The 2023-2024 CAPER summarizes the CDBG-funded activities undertaken by the City from July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024 (FY 2023-24). FY 2023-24 is the fourth year of the five years covered by the current Consolidated Plan. Accomplishment highlights for the year include the following:

- Infrastructure and Facility Improvements: CDBG funding was allocated to refurbish the
  fountains at Max Berg Park. During the reporting period, a consultant specializing in historic
  preservation was retained to prepare the required environmental review of the proposed
  project. Additional funding for construction was allocated to the project during FY 2024-25.
- Housing Rehabilitation: No homeowners were assisted during the reporting period.
- Public Social Services: Approximately 2,750 lower-income San Clemente residents were assisted during the reporting period.
- At-risk of Homelessness: No CDBG funding to support homelessness prevention services (e.g., case management, foodbank) was allocated during FY 2023-24.
- Administration: CDBG funds were used to provide program oversight and coordination and fair housing services to 58 households.
- The Orange County Housing Authority (OCHA) reports that it assisted 139 San Clemente households with rental assistance vouchers or certificates during the reporting period.

**Exhibit A** provides detailed expenditure and accomplishment information for FY 2023-24 CDBG activities undertaken during the reporting period.

The CARES Act of 2020 allocated \$654,596 in CDBG-Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) funds to San Clemente. The Act required that CDBG-CV funds be used to prevent, prepare for, or respond to local impacts of the Coronavirus pandemic. HUD required that the City spend 80% of CDBG-CV funds in three years and

100% in six years. In April 2023, HUD waived the 80% expenditure requirement. The City utilized all CDBG-CV funds by the conclusion of FY 2022-23 (i.e., June 30, 2023).

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

As summarized in Table 1, the City used CDBG funds to address the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan, including safety net programs for lower-income households:

- Age Well Senior Services provided case management services for homebound San Clemente seniors. Services included assessments and referrals to programs such as Meals on Wheels and homecare services. A total of 25 seniors were assisted during FY 2023-24.
- The Boys and Girls Club utilized CDBG funds to provide reduced-cost summer programming for lower-income youths. A total of 213 youths were assisted during the reporting period.
- Camino Health Center provides reduced-cost medical and pediatric dental care services for lower-income households, including the uninsured and the homeless – 2,178 San Clemente residents were served during FY 2023-24.
- The Fair Housing Foundation (FHF) provides services to overcome impediments to accessing safe and decent housing. The FHF provided outreach, education, and enforcement services for tenants, landlords, and property managers 58 households were served during FY 2023-24.
- Fun on the Run, a City-sponsored program, provides after-school and summer recreation services for lower-income youth; 302 youths were assisted during the FY 2023-24 reporting period.
- Parentis Foundation provides reading intervention tutoring for elementary-age children.
   Parentis links local senior volunteer tutors with children who are not reading at grade level.
   During the FY 2023-24 reporting period, 27 San Clemente youths were assisted.
- Vocational Visions provided job training, placement, and job coaching services for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities nine San Clement residents were assisted during the reporting period.

The City offers housing rehabilitation assistance to qualified homeowners and rental property owners. The programs aim to preserve and improve the City's existing housing stock. Improvements typically include installing new energy-efficient windows, termite treatment, new water heaters, and other housing health and safety improvements. No homeowners were assisted during the reporting period due to program staff transitions and to consider modifications to the current program. As previously reported, OCHA provided rental assistance to 139 San Clemente renter households.

As previously reported, CDBG funding was allocated to refurbish the fountains at Max Berg Park. During the reporting period, a consultant specializing in historic preservation was retained to prepare the required environmental review of the proposed project. Additional funding for construction was allocated to the project during FY 2024-25.

Accomplishments for the FY 2023-24 CDBG program are summarized in Exhibit A.

#### **Narrative**

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, most San Clemente residents are racially White – 77.1% (2022 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates). This data source also reports that 17.1% of the City's population is Hispanic/Latino – the City's largest minority population.

Based on Table 2, approximately 86% of program participants are White; 51% are reported to be ethnically Hispanic/Latino. A closer look at the accomplishment data from individual activities provides additional insight. A significant percentage of safety net program participants, such as medical care and youth recreation services, are from lower-income Hispanic/Latino households.

Accomplishment data provided by CDBG sub-recipients also indicates that over 78% of program beneficiaries are from extremely low-income households (i.e., a household with income less than 30% of the County median income). While data from the Consolidated Plan indicates no one San Clemente minority population is disproportionally experiencing a housing cost burden (i.e., households paying more than 30% of monthly income for housing), data from Table 2 and sub-recipients indicates that, in general, lower-income San Clemente households may be economically unstable and seek services to help to stabilize their economic situation.

#### Narrative

According to the City's 2023-24 Annual Action Plan, the City anticipated utilizing \$395,938 in CDBG program resources comprised of its 2023 CDBG Annual Allocation of \$314,259, plus \$81,679 in Prior Year Funds. The City did not anticipate receiving CDBG Program Income funds during the reporting period (i.e., Revolving Loan funds generated by the repayment of prior CDBG-funded housing rehabilitation loans). During the reporting period, the City received its 2023 CDBG grant of \$314,259 and had access to \$81,679 in Prior Year funds. Additionally, the City received \$45,146 in program income. As identified in Table 3, the City spent \$103,594 in CDBG funds during the reporting period.

In 2020, the City received \$654,596 in CDBG-CV funding in two rounds. Cumulatively, the City spent all CDBG-CV funds by the end of FY 2022-23. A detailed summary of CDBG and CDBG-CV expenditures is provided in **Exhibit B (PR26: Financial Summary Reports)**.

#### Narrative

Table 4 indicates that most CDBG expenditures during the 2023-24 reporting period were used citywide. A small amount was spent within the City's CDBG-eligible area (Max Berg Park). A list of the City's CDBG-eligible areas is provided in **Exhibit C**.

The City of San Clemente made an effort to leverage CDBG funds to the greatest extent possible. During the reporting period, \$293,827 in other funds were used to support activities consistent with Consolidated Plan goals:

Homeless Outreach Services: \$293,827 - Permanent Local Housing Allocation (PLHA)

There is no requirement to match the CDBG program.

### Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City did not meet planned housing rehabilitation program goals for the 2023-24 reporting period. The 2023-2024 Annual Action Plan set a one-year goal to rehabilitate six owner-occupied housing units. No homeowners were assisted during the reporting period due to program staff changes and to consider modifications to the current program to improve efficiencies.

#### Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

During the FY 2016-17 report period, the City undertook a comprehensive re-writing of its housing rehabilitation program. While the revised program policies and procedures were necessary to ensure program participant eligibility and proper underwriting (to protect the public's investment), some program streamlining remained necessary. During the FY 2023-24 reporting period, the City placed a hold on the program. The primary reason was program staff changes, including the retirement of the City's housing rehabilitation consultant. The retirement allowed City staff to assess the program's

effectiveness and efficiency. The City anticipates the program will be revised during FY 2024-25, with the goal to increase program efficiencies and to attract additional program participation.

#### **Narrative Information**

Table 7 typically provides information regarding the households that received housing rehabilitation assistance during FY 2023-24. As previously noted, no homeowners were assisted during the reporting period. As previously reported, OCHA provided 139 lower-income San Clemente households with rental assistance during the 2023-24 reporting period.

The City is not a recipient of HOME funds.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

No CDBG funds were allocated during the 2023-24 reporting period for homeless outreach; however, the City used PLHA funds to provide street outreach services for persons experiencing homelessness. During the 2023-24 reporting period, the City's Homeless Outreach staff assisted 276 homeless individuals. The Orange County Sheriff and regional homeless service providers such as Family Assistance Ministries (FAM) have also established outreach programs that engage homeless families. These efforts align with the regional Continuum of Care and its outreach and assessment strategy.

#### Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

During the 2023-24 reporting period, no CDBG funds were allocated for emergency shelter or transitional housing.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City's homeless strategy, as delineated in the Consolidated Plan, calls for providing safety net services that help prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless. To this end, during the 2023-24 reporting period, CDBG funds were allocated to safety net programs that assisted lower-income San Clemente households in maintaining shelter and meeting basic needs. Examples of safety net programs include reduced-cost medical and dental services and free or reduced-cost childcare services. OCHA reports providing rental assistance to six disabled homeless households with Continuum of Care Permanent Supportive Housing Certificates. Five formerly homeless veterans received Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) housing vouchers, and 14 households received Emergency Housing Vouchers to address a COVID-19 impact.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

During the 2023-24 reporting period, no CDBG funding was allocated to fund permanent housing activities for homeless persons. However, as reported above, OCHA provided ten homeless households with Continuum of Care Permanent Supportive Housing Certificates, five homeless veterans received Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH), and 14 San Clemente households received Emergency Housing Vouchers to address a COVID-19 impact.

The 2023-2024 Annual Action Plan indicates that the City would address barriers to affordable housing by considering the following actions:

- Housing Resources: Inclusionary Housing in-lieu fees may be available to help nonprofit
  agencies purchase land or existing housing units to create long-term affordable housing
  opportunities.
- **Environmental Review:** City staff is available to assist property owners and developers in navigating environmental review regulations to help reduce holding costs associated with the time needed to comply with environmental reviews.
- Planning and Development Fees: The City typically does not offer fee waivers; however, the
  City Council can approve a waiver, offer deferred or reduced fees, or supplement fees with
  public funds for affordable housing projects.
- **Permit and Processing Procedures:** For an affordable housing project, City staff is available to interact with project sponsors to help determine project feasibility and guide a developer through the entitlement process.
- Land Use Controls: In general, land use controls are necessary to protect public health, safety, and welfare and maintain the quality of life. The City has implemented reasonable controls that are appropriate for the community.
- **Tax Policies:** There is no local tax.

One affordable housing development project that accessed these policies was initiated during the reporting period. The Memorial Care Senior Housing & Medical Office project will contain 250 units - 20 units for very low-income senior households. The project received a density bonus and modified development standards for height and number of stories. The project remains in the planning phase.

#### Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City recognizes that special needs populations face challenges due to low income and their unique conditions (e.g., a disability). These factors make such individuals more likely to become homeless and often require housing and supportive services. The City considers supportive services and housing for special needs populations a priority. Supportive services are also considered a high priority in the Continuum of Care of Orange County. During FY 2023-24, the City-funded public service agencies provided a social safety net to help at-risk households. Services included access to reduced health care for lower-income San Clemente residents. Other special needs services funded during the reporting period include employment training and placement services for disabled adults.

#### Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Residential Lead-Based Paint (LBP) Hazard Reduction Act of 1992 changed the federal approach to addressing LBP by emphasizing preventing childhood lead poisoning through housing-based approaches. In response, the City includes lead-based paint hazard reduction as an eligible activity in its housing rehabilitation programs.

All application packets for the City's housing rehabilitation program include a notice to educate residents about the health dangers of lead and encourage screening of children for elevated blood-lead levels. All existing units are screened for lead-based paint before using federal funds. Housing units identified as having lead-based paint hazards are treated so the lead-based paint hazards are abated per federal requirements. The City's housing rehabilitation program is also designed to ensure safe work practices, as dictated by HUD, are implemented to address lead-paint hazards. As previously reported, no housing units were rehabilitated with CDBG funds during FY 2023-24.

#### Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, approximately 5.6% of San Clemente residents have incomes below the poverty level. This figure includes approximately 5.5% of City residents aged 65 and older and 2.4% of children under 18.<sup>[1]</sup> The Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan indicate that the City will support social services and housing activities for households below the poverty line in recognition that income enhancement services can help to increase household stability.

Recognizing that poverty-level households may need assistance, the City funded several activities to assist lower-income residents. For example, Camino Health Center, which provides reduced-cost medical and dental services for lower-income San Clemente residents, reports that approximately 91% of the program's FY 2023-24 beneficiaries have extremely low incomes. Age Well reports that 72% of the San Clemente seniors it served had extremely low incomes; Vocational Visions reports that 100% of the disabled San Clemente clients it served also had extremely low incomes. It is evident from this data that CDBG resources were critical resources in the community and assisted many individuals living in or near poverty.

#### Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

During FY 2023-24, the City continued efforts to eliminate institutional gaps and coordinate programs within the community and regionally. For example, the City partnered with local nonprofits to deliver public services. City departments also worked together to evaluate projects funded in whole or in part with CDBG funds that address priority needs. The City assisted OCHA by participating in the Cities Advisory Committee – a quarterly meeting of cities and OCHA to discuss federal rental housing assistance and regional housing issues. On a regional basis, the City supported the Orange County Continuum of Care (CoC) as it prepared the County's CoC Homeless Assistance grant application for HUD consideration.

The City also supports the CoC's efforts to develop the County's plan to end chronic homelessness and the regional discharge plan.

## Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

As indicated above, the City participated in regional coordination of services by participating in the quarterly Cities Advisory Committee held by OCHA to discuss federal rental housing assistance issues and as a contributor to the Orange County CoC Forum. Furthermore, through its CDBG and PLHA-funded programs, the City has coordinated the delivery of social services to the community that address various needs. The City has also established relationships with residential for-profit and nonprofit developers that may be prepared to respond to local affordable housing development opportunities.

## Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

Consolidated Plan regulations require CDBG recipients to (1) examine and attempt to alleviate housing discrimination within their jurisdiction; (2) promote fair housing choice for all persons; (3) provide opportunities for all persons to reside in any given housing development, regardless of race, color, religion, sex, disability, familial status, or national origin; (4) promote housing that is accessible to and usable by persons with disabilities; and (5) comply with the non-discrimination requirements of the Fair Housing Act. HUD encourages jurisdictions to consult with one another and initiate metropolitan-wide fair housing planning. The **Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI)** is the primary document for this purpose.

During the FY 2020-21 reporting period, the City participated as one of 20 jurisdictions in preparing the Orange County 2020-2024 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing (OC-AI). The OC-AI identified various actions that can be implemented over five years to address regional and local barriers to fair housing. The City contracts with the Fair Housing Foundation to provide fair housing outreach, education, and enforcement services and help the City address the impediments to fair housing identified in the OC-AI. A summary of AI-related actions is provided in **Exhibit D**.

The City's monitoring program has been designed to provide program staff with information to verify the accuracy of data supplied by sub-recipients, ensure that sub-recipients are carrying out individual activities as described in their contracts, and ensure that sub-recipients use appropriate accounting and record-keeping methods to manage CDBG funds. CDBG program policies help ensure sub-recipients receive training regarding CDBG grant management, CDBG program goals, and subrecipient obligations. For FY 2023-24, this training was held in October 2023.

On-site monitoring of sub-recipients is conducted biennially unless program or administrative issues are identified or the grant recipient is new to CDBG. The City last conducted on-site monitoring during the FY 2021-22 reporting period. FY 2023-24 monitoring is scheduled for FY 2024-25.

During the reporting period, program staff worked closely with City departments to ensure CDBG program regulations and other federal requirements were implemented. City departments and public service grant sub-recipients submit quarterly accomplishment reports. Subrecipients are also required to provide documentation to support CDBG reimbursement requests. Program staff conducts a desk monitoring of this information to ensure CDBG program compliance.

The City also made every effort to comply with CDBG and Consolidated Plan regulations. The City's Citizen Participation Plan ensures that community input is considered before undertaking a substantial amendment or submitting an annual update to HUD. It also provides residents the opportunity to review and comment on annual performance. Construction, professional service, and subrecipient agreements have been prepared to ensure compliance with applicable federal regulations. Additionally, the City has implemented an open procurement process that encourages bidding from minority and women-owned businesses.

#### Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

To encourage resident participation in the City's CDBG program, the City published a notice in the *San Clemente Times* on August 29, 2024, announcing a 15-day public comment period and public hearing for the 2023-24 CAPER. The CAPER was available for public review on the City's website (https://www.san-clemente.org/departments-services/housing-and-social-services). An additional opportunity for public comments was availed at the September 17, 2024, San Clemente City Council meeting.
